April 2008 Monthly Project Status Report

Enclosed you will find our Monthly Project Status Report, for the period ending April 11th. Notable activities include the following:

Construction:

- Approximately 95% of the ballpark pile driving is complete. A few piles remain to be driven at the core building, and near centerfield. Additional helical piles are also being installed for the loading dock area, and in the area of the mat-slab beneath the 5th Street bridge.
- All piles and pilecaps are complete for the pedestrian plaza and bridges over I-394. Columns and piercaps are ongoing near the 2nd/6th intersection.
- All precast beams are fabricated for the pedestrian plaza and bridges.
- Column placement adjacent to the BNSF tracks is complete, and girders have been placed over the BNSF mainline to Gridline 10. This work will continue adjacent to, and over the tracks from south to north over the next two months.
- The core building slab and foundation work are ongoing. Underground electrical ducts to the Northstar and Hiawatha commuter platforms are currently being installed.
- Service level column placement is now proceeding from 7th Street north along the third base line. Grade beams and foundations for the stadia raker beams are underway, and have been completed around home plate.
- The main concourse deck from right field towards home plate is complete, and now has turned north along the BNSF ROW. Shoring and forming and placement of the club level decks continue along 7th Street.
- Collisys Electric has begun installation of support anchors for the I-394 lighting system beneath the "A" and "B" ramps.
- Northstar has mobilized and resumed work on the 5th Street bridge deck, and the landing area adjacent to the ESB building.
- The ESB sanitary sewer repairs are complete, and the system has been switched over to the new line.
- Utility work is scheduled to begin in 3rd Avenue North in May, when Xcel Energy and Qwest will begin installation of ductbanks to provide power and fiber/communications to the ballpark.
- In July Centerpoint Energy will begin installation of the final leg of the natural gas main serving the ballpark, down 3rd Avenue North from North 2nd Street, across Washington, to the MTC turn-around. This work should be completed in late August.

Design:

- A final lighting plan for the 5th Street sidewalk adjacent to the LRT platform has been agreed upon with Northstar. Northstar has agreed to pay for the extra fixtures.
- SRF Consulting continues to develop the 2nd Ave. signal conversion plans.

Budget:

 Work continues to execute the amendments to the Mortenson contract, and to the Development Agreement, to reflect the newly adopted project budget. See the attached Project Budget Update for more details.

Schedule:

• Overall the project remains on schedule.

Safety:

• Mortenson held a site safety luncheon on Thursday, April 3rd, to celebrate 60 straight calendar days without a recordable accident on site.

Community Participation (thru March):

• See the attached Community Participation Program update.

Quality:

- AET and Braun-Intertec continue to provide on-site special inspections and testing.
 Discrepancies and non-conformance items are recorded and tracked until resolved.
- MnDOT personnel have been retained to provide certain plant fabrication inspections associated with the bridge structures over I-394.
- HOK continues to provide on-site observation reports.

Claims/Change Orders/Disputes:

- Dakota County has issued a letter to Waste Management / Burnsville, demanding immediate cleanup of ballpark soils improperly disposed of at the Burnsville site. WM has (10) days in which to present to Dakota County a cleanup plan for their review and approval.
- Changes of various magnitudes are regularly reviewed and addressed, which
 primarily are reflective of changes that arise in the design and contracting of a fasttrack project.

Below is a status update on the components of our Community Participation Program.

SWMBE Program

- The SWMBE project goal is 30%. The aggregate SWMBE participation achieved to date is 31%.
- We have procured approximately \$197M dollars of work for the project with \$61M committed to SWMBE firms.
- Approximately 36 SWMBE firms are involved with the project with numerous firms having multiple contracts including 9 firms with prime contracts.

Workforce Diversity

- The project utilization goals are 25% minority and 5% female. The goals are expressed as a percentage of the total project work hours.
- The project utilization levels through February were 15% minority and 6% female with approximately 164,000 total hours worked. This is an increase in the minority participation from January.
- There were approximately 250 workers on the project in February.
- We are not satisfied with the current level of minority participation and have taken steps to increase participation, mainly involving the re-composition of the work crews of the major contractors to include more minority workers.
- As a result, 10 of the 15 major contractors increased their minority participation during March.
- We anticipate the March minority participation to increase to 16%.

Community Workforce Program

- To date, 12 individuals have been hired for the CWP program; 5 females and 7 males.
- The referral organizations have been Summit Academy, Construction Careers Coalition (CCC) and Merrick.
- CCC presented an overview of their program to the prime contractors March 10.

Outreach

- We continue to have discussions and meetings with subcontractors regarding the procurement opportunities on the project.
- We will be holding an open house to announce the finishes and interiors contracts to the contracting community.
- Bid alert announcements are sent to community based organizations announcing the scopes of work being procured.
